You are holding the letter of introduction that gives meaning to Inferniño and reflects our love for the city that saw us get started.


We want you to know a bit more about the apartments where you are staying, the reason why we are called "Inferniño" and why they form part of a special place, ranging from their architecture to their location.

On the one hand, the building has been carefully restored, respecting its history while boldly enhancing its evocative power.

On the other hand, it is worth noting that Inferniño is, along with the Hostal dos Reis Católicos, the only accommodation that can boast about having views of Praza do Obradoiro, with the Cathedral and the destination of the Way of St. James as centuries-old witnesses.

This overview is not meant to be a tourist guide; our objective is merely to give you, from a local perspective, a series of recommendations so that you can enjoy some routes around the city, trips around the surroundings and Galicia, and have some practical information.

Welcome to Inferniño, enjoy Santiago, and here you have Inferniño 100% Compostela.

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Why "Inferniño"?

We had doubts, a lot of doubts, when it came to choosing a name for our apartments.

We are aware that the letter "ñ" and the Internet do not always get on well together. Also, our nearness to Praza do Obradoiro could be taken advantage of with a more allusive, business-friendly name. However, it was the weight of history, in a city that is also World Heritage, that guided us so as to make the right choice.

Inferniño is, in fact, the historic name of this part of Compostela.

In the past, this street led to an uncontrolled rubbish dump. The constant burning produced an endless amount of smoke. People therefore sarcastically differentiated between, on the one hand, the noble area of Obradoiro, which housed the Cathedral (i.e. heaven) and, on the other hand, this other area, which was called the "infierno" (hell). One final detail: we Galicians use diminutives with a lot of irony.

This therefore resulted in the name "Infernino" (little hell).

On top of that, we realised that this house dates precisely from the year 1666, a number that, of course, is fairly similar to that of the Beast.

Now that you know, we would like you to form part of our history as well.





Inferniño

Apartments

A stone plaque located just a few metres from the front door of our apartments reveals that they used to be a hall of residence built by the University of Santiago. The University's ownership is indicated by the coat of arms featuring five stars carved in stone in the building's façade.

These symbols, incidentally, form part of our city's unique heritage. Their origin dates from the construction boom that the city experienced in the Middle Ages, due to the popularity of the Way of St.

Nevertheless, despite the growth in the number of residents and visitors, there were very few property owners. Houses proved to be expensive and only the rich could afford to build them, thereafter renting them out.

The objective of these symbols was precisely to indicate who the owner was: the local administration was represented by a chalice, the Cathedral's chapter by a scallop shell, the Monastery of San Martiño Pinario by a pine tree... and the University by five stars.

We invite you to look for them while strolling around the old town.

However, let us get back to what we were talking about: you are in a building that is almost four hundred years old, which, throughout the ages, housed students, teachers and parish priests... and now welcomes pilgrims to Compostela and visitors eager to discover Santiago.

We have often wondered what the architects Emilio López Matas and Mónica Rivera wanted to convey when they planned the building's restoration. We have reached the conclusion that they wanted the guests staying in the Inferniño Apartments to feel as if they were living in a 17th-century house, without giving up the comforts of modern life. A challenge that is not at all easy to undertake in a very sensitive area.

Their restoration was meticulous. We do not want you to leave before appreciating their work and discovering the many details that can turn your stay into a unique experience.





We would like to tell you, for example, that they replicated exactly the balustrade and entrance to the building that existed in 1666 or that the building's chestnut planks—which are protected heritage elements—are original, the same as the steps of the stairway.

The wooden floors that you are standing on are also original, although some small parts had to be replaced since they were beyond repair. This explains the contrasts or "patches" that you can see.

You should also have a look at the partition wall in the common area on the ground floor. There you can see how the interior walls have been replaced with new ones, but using the same building

technique as in the past, namely "barrotillo," which consisted of a framework of strips and bars that were plastered over. In this specific case, the structure was made using pine strips and then lime mortar was applied manually.

We also invite you to observe the enclosed balconies, a very characteristic architectural feature in Galicia due to the weather, which have been carved and assembled using a single piece of cedar wood.

And what can we say about the garden? It stands out on its own as a haven of peace, exuberant greenery and murmuring water right in the centre of Compostela's old town, an oasis in the midst of centu-



ries-old stones and the hustle and bustle of pilgrims and visitors.

The house still has its original well, a small pond where the flowing water and singing birds invite relaxation alongside the two hundred-year-old camellias framing an attractive, contemporary cabin made of wood and glass.

All of the aforementioned enables us to claim that Inferniño is more than just a building housing tourist apartments; it is a manual that pays tribute to traditional building techniques from a 20th-century architectural perspective, a perfect balance between historical essence and modern comforts.

Each one of its six apartments has its own personality and, along with the common areas, Inferniño Apartments invites you to make yourself at home, not just as a place for sleeping but rather one for experiencing Compostela.

Not in vain, Inferniño's modern interior design led to it being shortlisted in 2018 at the prestigious FAD Awards for Architecture.

Finally, we invite you to admire the photos that you will find all over the building. These will enable you to see Inferniño through the lens of Daniel Riera, a renowned Catalan photographer who was also captivated by Inferniño's magic.

We would also like to express our commitment to the environment. Not in vain, apart from respecting the architectural ensemble and its surroundings, we support sustainable consumption. In this regard, all of the energy used by the apartments comes from a biomass boiler located in the basement.

We sincerely hope that we have helped you to understand more about Inferniño. If so, we will have attained our goal.

Santiago de Compostela

The City

The best reflection of what this city is leads us to begin with a cliché, or rather a typical cliché, which we can access from Inferniô's entrance by just looking right: the square called Praza do Obradoiro.

The four sides of the square, and the buildings therein, define Santiago perfectly, since they represent the city's four main driving forces: the religious authority, the phenomenon of pilgrimages, the civil administration and the University, one of the oldest in Spain with more than five hundred years of history. Each of these buildings also features a different architectural style.

We thereby come across the Cathedral and its spectacular baroque façade; the Parador Hostal dos Reis Católicos (plateresque), a former pilgrim hospital founded by Queen Isabella and King Ferdinand; Pazo de Raxoi (neoclassical), which houses the City Council and the Galician President's Office; and Colexio de San Xerome (late Romanesque), which is home to the University Rector's Office.

Knowledge, religion, politics and tourism show their best face in the epicentre of Compostela, the location of the Way of St. James' kilometre O.

They form the basis of the stone miracle that became this city in northwest Spain, witness to how the discovery of the Apostle James' tomb has attracted millions of pilgrims down through the centuries, thereby shaping the idea of Europe in the words of Goethe.

Now imagine this square 800 years ago, full of workers, ironsmiths, carpenters or masons and how, in its surroundings, stone by stone, streets and buildings arose to shape a city that has gradually grown and evolved over centuries down to the present.

Think about how every step you take, right here or when you venture beyond the Inferniño Apartments, form new traces of the history that has changed and defined this part of the world.



La Vaquería and other buildings

An old dairy converted into designer houses that won a national architecture award for the architect Victor López Cotelo. Continuing through Galeras Park, we come across the estate called Finca do Espiño, featuring a modernist building designed by the Santiago architect and businessman Jesús López de Rego.

Vista Alegre Park

Four contemporary buildings designed by two architects, César Portela and Antón García Abril, featuring the Natural History Museum, the Advanced Studies Centre, the SGAE building and the School of High Musical Studies. They are all located on an estate crowned by a house that used to belong to the Banca Simeón family.

Faculty of Media Studies

One of the projects designed in Santiago by the Portuguese architect Álvaro Siza Vieira, winner of the Pritzker Architecture Prize. Perspectives, volumes, a search for light, an entire space for the senses in which Siza also designed the signs and furniture.

An urban development project featuring a large glass canopy, in which the architects Albert Viaplana and Helio Piñón incorporate a search for the perspective towards the entrance to the old town, a balcony facing the hill surrounding Compostela (El Pedroso), a coach terminus for dropping off passengers and tourists, and a subtle multi-purpose sports pavilion 200 m from the Cathedral, all integrated into a project without spoiling the surroundings.

Álvaro Siza's first project in Santiago; its greatest merit is how he managed to integrate a contemporary building into such a unique heritage site as San Domingos de Bonaval, which houses the ethnographic museum known as the "Museo do Pobo Galego." Not to be missed is the adjacent garden of the same name, whose "normal" features include a sculpture by Chillida, the constant presence of water and being able to wander around a former cemetery.

Almost a posthumous project by John Hedjuk, master of master architects with two projects in Santiago, despite his limited presence in Europe. His other project, the Hejduk Towers, which are located in the City of Culture, were originally planned for Belvís Park, near the A Trisca Sociocultural Centre.

Designed by the North American architect Peter Eisenman, the Galician City of Culture is a new, large-scale contemporary architecture project featuring different cultural spaces. It reflects the almond shape of Compostela's old town, while the heights of its buildings respect the relief of the terrain on which it was built. Guided tours at the weekend, magnificent exhibitions and great views of the city from John Heiduk's Towers make this visit a must.

It features a small spice garden, and an architectural contrast between the two buildings at its entrance and the city's former cemetery at the top of the park. People wander around the cemetery without giving it a second thought, while tourists take photos from behind Eduardo Chillida's sculptures, which frames the Cathedral ensemble. Linked to Bonaval Park via Rúa Teo, it is a pleasant, typical neighbourhood park, As the highest point in the city, it features a beautiful view of Santiago's old town.

Pablo Iglesias Park

Another neighbourhood park, it serves as a transition leading to another emblematic part of the city: the University of Santiago's North Campus. Built on a slope, it features rest areas, a cycling route, drinking-water fountains, sports ground and children's playground.

"La Música en Compostela" Park

Located at the entrance to the University of Santiago's North Campus, it features the Auditorio de Galicia designed by Cano Lasso-its architectural structure pays tribute to Galician architecture (stone, galleries, arcaded streets)crowned by a sculpture by Eugenio Granell (a renowned Galician surrealist painter) and a pond reflecting the building in its waters. A little further up is the Faculty of Media Studies, a magnificent building designed by the renowned Portuguese architect Álvaro Siza.

La Finca Vista Alegre Park

A 19th-century park featuring palm trees, orange trees, camellias and monkey-puzzle trees, along with four contemporary architecture buildings designed by Antón García Abril (SGAE building and School of Musical Studies) and César Portela (Centre of Advanced Studies and Luís Iglesias Natural History Museum). In the midst of them, watching over them, is the Casa de Europa, a colonial-style construction that belonged to the estate's former owners.

A meadow along the banks of the Sarela River, featuring a curious panoramic view of the Cathedral. We recommend going on a 360o tour to appreciate all of the surrounding buildings and, in the background, a private estate called Finca do Espiño, which can be visited and is currently being restored; it features one of the few gems of Galician modernism, López de Rego's Pazo do Espiño -don't miss its gargoyles!

"Carballeira" (oak grove) and Pazo de San Lorenzo

The Way of St. James to Fisterra runs alongside the wall of the beautiful Pazo de San Lorenzo de Trasouto, a former convent featuring a beautiful church—it is worth visiting just to see the magnificent boxwood hedge in one of its cloisters.

La Alameda

It is the city park par excellence. Also in 19th-century style, it is full of details and sculptures. At the top, it features one of the city's oldest Romanesque churches: Santa Susana. It also features the avenue called Paseo de la Herradura, with marvellous panoramic views of the Cathedral, an acoustic bench and, finally, a bandstand and benches in the main avenue (Salón Central), made in the furnaces of the renowned Sargadelos Factory.

Belvís Park

Its labyrinth of camellia hedges stands out, crowned by the Minor Seminary. It is worth going up there, at the top of the park, to admire the panoramic views of the city from the viewpoint located among the terraces. You can sweeten up your walk by buying some biscuits sold by the Dominican nuns in Belvis Convent or visit the small building (A Trisca Sociocultural Centre) designed by the master architect Hejduk –two of the North American's three projects in Europe are located in Santiago.

The renowned Galician sculptor made this beautiful doorknocker of Casa de Vaamonde (which houses the Consorcio de Santiago). Beautifully sculpted in bronze, it features a snake eating a frog.

Just beside Casa de Vaamonde, it has frequently been photographed by groups of Compostela residents in "single file" since it is so narrow; it makes for a great photo of Compostela.

♦ The old town's peepholes

Clear reminiscences of how the old town's inhabitants could see who was visiting them, by looking through peepholes located in the ceiling of the porch.

The acoustic bench

Located in the Alameda garden, you have to sit at each end of the semicircle that makes up this acoustic stone bench, and if you whisper, you can see how the bench conveys the sound, which enabled couples to engage in sweet talk without being overheard.

▼ The lovers' bench

Near the statue of Valle Inclán, in Paseo de la Herradura, this bench surrounds one of Galicia's oldest eucalyptus trees, which were brought from Australia by Fray Rosendo Salvado. It is one of the city's most-photographed spots, with Santiago Cathedral in the background.

• The angel's spectacles

Inside the Church of María Salomé in Rúa Nova (the only church dedicated to the Apostle James' mother), do not miss the curious statue of a pregnant Our Lady, while at the base of a 15th-century altarpiece you can see an angel wearing spectacles –one of the first iconographic appearances of this object in history.

Many Compostela residents and students play practical jokes on first-time visitors, telling them that, if they look at the bottom of the fountain, they will be able to see the feet of the illustrious bust of Cervantes crowning it, and then splashing them when they get close to the water.

Rúa Preguntoiro and former city hall

Many people are unaware that the house at the corner of Praza de Cervantes and Rúa Preguntoiro used to be the city hall. This street's name comes from the fact that this is where town criers used to publicly announce municipal proclamations.

Church of San Fruetuoso

Located behind the city hall and with a good view from the stone balcony in Praza do Obradoiro (between the city hall and Hostal de los Reves Católicos), it is known as the church of the Spanish playing cards, with its suits representing justice and temperance. Great views and photos at the end of the day.

The Pilgrim's Shadow

Many people visit Praza da Quintana at night to take a photo of the "pilgrim's shadow," which is formed by the shadows of the stone supporting Santiago Cathedral's lightning conductor, Holding a staff and wearing a pilgrim's hat, the shadow adds a curious nocturnal touch to this beautiful necrological square (formerly a cemetery).

Lauds in San Paio de **Antealtares**

For early birds and late owls, you can enjoy a relaxing moment in the very early morning by entering the Church of San Pajo de Antealtares and listening to the cloistered nuns singing lauds -the convent's church is hidden away in the north corner of Praza da Quintana- accompanied by the sound of Compostela's bestknown bell called the "Berenguela."

Now very popular with tourists and residents alike, it has become the most important market in the city and the region –it was Santiago de Compostela's first covered market. It features numerous stalls, both inside and outside, where you can buy fresh produce or have anything you have bought prepared for eating right there.

San Domingos de Bonaval



Recommendations



- Santiago is a convenient city, made for walking. You can reach practically every place of interest on foot.
- 2 It is important to look upwards when walking around the old town, in order to appreciate more details than you can see at first sight. It all forms part of a historic-artistic ensemble carved in stone over the centuries.
- 3 The atmosphere is lively all day, since it is a university city as well as an administrative and tourist centre. It is usually busier on rainy days, especially in summer, when a lot of people staying on the coast come to visit Santiago.
- 4 Do not hesitate to ask the locals for help; Galicians are very hospitable, friendly and obliging.

5 city. If you have any kind of problem as regards your safety or health, you can call the toll-free emergency number (112) 24 hours a day.


- 6 The official currency is the euro; you should carry some cash with you since some establishments do not accept credit cards. Throughout the city you will find ATMs and the usual services present in any European city.
- 7 Business hours are generally from 9 or 10 am to 2 pm and from 4 to 8 pm, although shopping centres are usually open from 10 am to 10 pm without closing at lunchtime.
- 8 In Galicia, apart from Spanish, Galician is also spoken as an official language.
- 9 More and more people now speak English in the city, especially in bars and restaurants, hotels and shops.
- 10 Santiago is a very active city as regards gastronomy, with more than 500 eating establishments of different types. See our top picks on page 42.

- 11 The "mercado de abastos" (food market) is a temple of quality produce. You can savour Galician-style octopus on Thursdays and Saturdays. or buy some shellfish and have it prepared for you, to eat right away, for a small price in the market's building number 5.
- 19 Santiago is known for its complimentary tapas, which are normally served along with drinks free of charge, both inside bars and at tables outdoors
- 13 If you would like to enjoy a nice glass of wine in Santiago. you should visit the area around the "plaza de abastos" (food market) the Troia-Praza Cervantes-San Martiño area, the emerging district of A Rúa de San Pedro and the traditional area of Rúa do Franco and A Raíña, where you can savour complimentary tapas and wines from Galicia's 5 official wine-making regions ("designations of origin").

- 14. You can try foods such as "empanadas" (Galician pies) with different fillings, octopus prepared in different ways. local seafood fresh fish from the Atlantic Ocean and Galician coast, meat, local vegetables and greens.
